From the **Spiritual Director**

Our reading is from Matthew 20:1-16 which says, "The kingdom of Heaven is like a landowner who goes out early in the morning and hires some laborers for his vineyard and says that he will pay them the usual wage for a day's work.

He then went out about 9:00, saw some standing in the marketplace and hired them to work in his vineyard and told them that he would pay them what is right. He went out again at Noon and three o'clock and did the same. At 5:00 o'clock he went out and found others standing idle and asked them "Why are you standing idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us," they replied. He told them to go into the vineyard and work also.

At the end of the day, the owner told his manager to call the laborers in and pay them, beginning with the last and going to the first. When those who came to work at 5:00 were paid, they received the going wage for a day's work.

Now when the first came to be paid, they thought that they were going to receive more than the going rate for a day's work, but each of them received the usual daily wage. And when they receive it, they grumbled and said that it was not fair. "Those who worked only one hour received as much as those who worked in the hot sun all day." But the owner replied to them, "Friend, I am doing no wrong. Did you not agree to work for the whole day at the usual daily rate? Take what belongs to you and go. I chose to give to the last the same as I gave to the first. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Are you envious because I am generous? So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

It just does not seem to be fair. But you see, life is not always fair. We see good things happen to bad people and bad things happen to good people.

We see some labor for hours for just a little and we see others make hundreds of thousands of dollars simply because of who they are. We see some who are physically fit and die young and others who abuse their bodies and live to a ripe old age.

Then we get this story of people who worked for only one hour getting the same as those who worked for an entire day. One is tempted to say that this story sets a bad example like so many other things that Jesus does, like: 1) Eating with tax collectors; 2) Hanging out with prostitutes and known criminals; 3) Healing people on the Sabbath; and, 4) Telling sinners that they are forgiven just because they have faith in him

Isn't God not being fair when He sends the rain on the just and the unjust and makes the sun shine on the righteous and the unrighteous? A minister in Canada said recently, "Stop looking for a Fair God, and be thankful for the One that you got."

Are you with the laborers who worked all day and received what they agreed on? Or are you with the ones who were hired late in the day and received more than they possibly could earn? Are you with the oldest son who worked hard and did not squander his inheritance or are you with the younger son who was delivered from the pig sty?

Thanks for the Memories ... a Tribute to Al Rhonemus

Dear Community, We lost an icon of the LOVE Community in Al Rhonemus. I would ask for a moment of silence and reflection on Al's life.

Dear Community, on May 7, 2010, AI Rhonemus passed from this earth into Heaven. Though we mourn the loss of a dear and treasured friend here on earth, there is no doubt in my mind that AI is dancing through Heaven today on steady legs as he praises our Lord.

As many of you know, Al and Patty (along with several others) were instrumental in the organization of our LOVE Community. Al had a passion for having a local Emmaus Community so that more people in our area could not only experience the wonderful Walk to Emmaus, but more easily participate in the Community, as well. He spoke often of his joy in participating in the Limestone Ohio Valley Emmaus Community.

A few people have written tributes to Al and we'll share them here. Below is an article from a member of the Community who was also one of the many pioneers involved in making the LOVEmmaus Community a reality:

I had heard much talk about AI Rhonemus (mostly from John Denham) and he seemed larger than life to me in those stories. No man could possibly be as "Christian", caring and loving - and fun - as the stories of AI. I quickly found out that the stories were true and that Patty and AI, whether they knew it or not, would have a profound impact on my life and, as you know, many more in the Love Community.

I do remember that first meeting fondly but I am not sure when the talk turned into "Let's start our own Community". Shortly after, the Cincinnati Emmaus Community sponsored the Love Community and promised to leave a spot open on those teams for a member of the LOVE Community until such a time as we were ready for our own Walk.

From that experience, we were ready to start Walk #1! While it was clear that AI was still our leader (and was until the day he died!), Cincinnati assigned a Lay Director and an Assistant Lay Director to help us on that Walk. We then started the Men's Team training for our first Walk. After only what I think was two meetings, the Lay Director decided that we were not ready for a Walk. The Upper Room shut down that Walk, which the men now affectionately call "Walk Zero". We now know that was a God thing.

In a very short time, with AI and John's help, we started what turned out to be LOVE Community Men's Walk #1 with the former Assistant Lay Director as our new Lay Director - a guy by the name of Bob Hedleston!

I still remember how awesome the first Walk was-in a very dimly lit "Men's Dorm" serving as both the Team Dorm and the Conference Room! I also still remember, on that team and many others, the gentle, caring presence and guidance of AI Rhonemus. He led by example, spoke up when he had to and served with an energy that none of the rest of us could match. AI was our unquestioned leader. From there, the Holy Spirit took over and has made the LOVE Community what it is today

After that first Men's Walk, there was no discussion as to who should be our first Men's Lay Director from the LOVE Community. That man was AI Rhonemus and, again, he served and set an example that all subsequent Lay Directors would try to emulate - no way to duplicate.

Never, in all of my times with AI, did I see him get grumpy - and you know that is easy to do on a Walk considering the fatigue. Never did I see him be anything but an example of what Christ would have us all to be. He was our leader in every possible sense of the word.

Al would never take credit, and perhaps would be a bit uncomfortable with, any credit given him for the success of the LOVE Community. He knew - and we know - that it is the Holy Spirit moving in us and in the Community that makes the Walks work. Whether he would agree or not, that Spirit moved in Al Rhonemus to the point where it was contagious. We all loved him and wanted to be around him because of that Spirit.

I thank God for my friendship with AI Rhonemus and my involvement in the LOVE Community. For all of us who had the privilege of knowing him, he made an eternal difference.

We just let one of our special people go be with the Lord. It was hard and will be hard for awhile, for we will miss him so. But we know where he is and I am sure he is feeling much better and would not want to come back. He is just waiting for us to come to him.

Please keep Patty Rhonemus and the family in your prayers, that they will be comforted and lean on Jesus. We don't know when we will be called Home so we need to be ready to meet our Savior.

Our Board is charged with the task of being good stewards with the finances God provides so that we can take care of the needs of our Community and the Walks we sponsor each year. As costs rise in every area, our budget gets stretched more and more to make that happen.
