From the Community Spiritual Director



I just finished reading a devotional by Rick Warren based on 1 John 3:16. We all know what John 3:16 says, but how many of us can quote 1 John 3:16? This verse tells us, "This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers." Eugene Peterson puts it this way in The Message: "This is how we've come to understand and experience love: Christ sacrificed his life for us. This is why we ought to live sacrificially for our fellow believers, and not just be out for ourselves." With the recent completion of Women's Walk #25, I can look back and see that our community is very good at 'laying down our lives' for our brothers or our sisters. I think we often connect 'laving down our lives' with death. After all, we're told that was the sacrifice Jesus made for us, so is that the sacrifice we need to make? What does 'laying down our lives' really mean? When Paul said that he 'died daily' (1 Corinthians 15:31), he certainly did not mean a physical death, although in his situation, that was always a possibility. He meant giving up his desires, his wants, his will, and doing the will of Christ, doing things that would benefit his brothers and sisters in Christ. Very few of us in the USA will ever be asked to physically die because of our faith. That happens in many places in our world and we need to pray regularly for Christians who are persecuted in such a manner, but we have been blessed to live in a nation where, at least for now, we don't face such extreme measures.

John's writings tell us to lay down our lives. Remember how you laid down your life during the most recent walks? You prayed in the middle of the night. You helped clean the camp grounds. You gave up a Thursday, Saturday, or Sunday evening. Some of you gave up several Saturdays or Friday evenings to prepare for the walk. You provided meals, agape, or snacks. You served in many different ways. This, my brothers and sisters, is laying down your life. You have done a great job being the hands and feet of Christ during our walks. The one thing I hope we are doing is not limiting the laying down of our lives to Emmaus Walks. Remember, the purpose of Emmaus is to develop strong leaders in our local churches. We need to continue to lay down our lives daily, as Paul said he did, and live our lives in such a way that we serve our brothers and sisters on a regular basis, not just during Emmaus Walks. I have no doubt that you are all living your lives in this manner but sometimes we need to slow down and examine our daily lives to make sure we are living as Christ would have us. I know Jesus died for us but we need to remember that he also lived for us. Let us live each day for Him.
